Developer's plan flows to committee

Some wary of Lexington subdivision's
idea to connect to Waltham sewer line

WALTHAM - Several city councilors last night said they are unhappy over a request from a developer of a Lexington subdivision to connect to a sewer line that runs through Waltham.

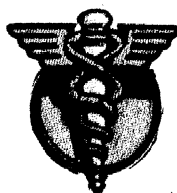
Lexington August Realty Trust is asking to reconnect and reactivate a sewer line from the Lexington Hills subdivision, located on Walnut Street in Lexington, to a manhole which dis- charges into a main sewer trunk

line which runs through both communities.

Phillip McCourt, an attorney representing the developer, said the sewer line used to serve the Middlesex County Hospital and later the Olympus Hospital on that property. He said the line would provide service to 19-sin- gle family homes in the Lexing- ton Hills subdivision. Each of the homes will have four bedrooms.
