CONDO NEWS Announcement

We also hope other experienced and capable people among us such as lawyers, engineers and people with construction or financial, etc. backgrounds would like to serve our community as trustees. There is no doubt that the residents here at Wellington Crossing will elect candidates for trustees who, in conjunction with the management company, will govern and make decisions for the benefit of our community.

CONDO FOOD FOR THOUGHT The Economy

More than half of the condo associations in this country are concerned about the economy. Many already have a cash flow problem. Many are cutting services. Quite a few actually are closing their pools. In the south, a few are using volunteers to help reduce some costs without compromising services. In fact, even in the Boston area there is at least one condo where a specific weekend in the spring is designated for residents to go outside for a massive cleanup of the property.

Hopefully, none of us here at Wellington Crossing are going to be in such financial hardship that we can't afford to pay our monthly fees but just think, if under proper supervision a dozen or so of us plant the annuals instead of paying to have them planted, we may save roughly the same amount of money as if 3 owners missed fee payments. Certainly a few of us could volunteer under supervision to put preservative on the wood fence by the trash corral. Crowninshield and the Pulte Board of Trustees would most likely welcome our ideas for keeping expenses down without compromising quality The next step is for individuals to develop formal proposals and submit them to our reps for presentation to the Trustees.

Plastic bags must go in the dumpsters or they can be returned to most supermarkets. Cardboard must fit inside the containers or be put in the dumpsters. Electronic recycling can be picked up only by calling 877-944-7019, ext 2. And when stopping at the trash area, please park in front of the gate so that traffic is not blocked. Parking on the road blocks the already narrow opening.

TIPS OF THE MONTH

Contractors Directory - (Linda's List)

Many of us at Wellington Crossing are previous residents of Waltham and the surrounding towns, and we may have knowledge of local businesses to share with newcomers to the area.

If you should ever need a tradesman (electrician, plumber, painter, etc.) to do work or repairs in your unit, or would like a referral for a doctor, dentist, hairdresser, etc., you may find a list of local vendors to be helpful with your search. The list will be comprised of the business name and full contact information. We may also include a list of references. The contractors listed will only be suggestions, and no particular contractor should be taken as an endorsement by any resident at Wellington Crossing. You will still want to contact any references given by the contractor before approving any work to commence.

Please note: All repair work to be performed within Wellington Crossing must be performed by a licensed and insured contractor and a permit may be required by the City of Waltham. Any structural addition, alteration, or improvement including all finish flooring changes inside any unit must be approved first by the Association, before an application for a building permit is even submitted to the City of Waltham.

Furnace Filters

All our units have a furnace filter which occasionally needs replacing. This is just a reminder. There are some inexpensive filters which are rated for 30 days. Most accordion type filters are rated for 90 days. When filters start to get clogged, one ends up paying more for electricity and the temperature has larger fluctuations. No one can tell you how often you should change a filter, but you really shouldn't waste money using the 30 day filters. Certainly do not go anywhere near a full year without at least checking the accordion type. All you have to do is take it out and hold it up to a light. It is pretty obvious. It also is very advisable to make certain that it is clean at the beginning of the air conditioning and the heating seasons.

WELLNESS ITEM

All of us need medical attention at some time. Waltham actually is guite rich in available services. There are independent doctors in addition to medical associations. There is a hospital and clinics. There are quite a few rehab facilities. There also are home care service providers. This covers the entire spectrum of short term needs. If you are healthy, it actually is the best time to check these out. Most are more than glad to answer your questions and show you around. In fact, on some nice spring day, you can walk down Trapelo Rd to the fire house, and then take a left onto Woburn St. A very short distance further on your right will be Meadow Green Rehab. Walk in and ask for a small tour. A major advantage of checking out places when you can is that if unfortunately you have a medical problem and end up in any of the Boston Hospitals, many are not directly acquainted with most of the Waltham facilities so you need to be your own advocate.

WELLINGTON GREEN

Recently a problem has significantly escalated and our reps and Crowninshield Management, in concert with the Trustees, will soon be addressing it. They will be issuing a written reminder concerning dog waste. The first offense will probably be a warning and the second will involve a fine. Maybe if enough fines are collected, we can afford to buy a few "Fido Houses". These can be best described as a post with a durable attractive box containing a baggie dispenser as well as a discrete receptacle for the "trash".

We must remember that each and every one of us has already agreed in writing that "all pets must be registered with the management" and "repeated disturbance caused by a pet including but not limited to staining of grass and shrubs, shall be cause for the pet's removal from the premises, by a vote of the trustees".

Please contact Crowninshield Management if you observe a violation of the pet rules. All calls will be considered confidential. The only way we can begin to control the situation is to deal with the individuals who may not be picking up after their pets.

SHARE A RECIPE by JoAnn New England Boiled Dinner

3 lbs. corned beef
1 tsp. peppercorns or 1/4 tsp. pepper
6 whole cloves
1 bay leaf
6 carrots, halved lengthwise
6 potatoes, peeled and quartered
1 medium cabbage, cut into 6 wedges

In large saucepan, cover corned beef with water. Add peppercorns, clove, and bay leaf. Simmer covered, 3 to 3 ½ hours or until tender. Add potatoes and carrots. Simmer covered 15 minutes longer. Add cabbage: cook 15 min. or until vegetables are tender. Remove bay leaf. Cut meat into pieces and serve with cooking liquid and vegetables. Serves 6 to 8.
