Wellington House Restoration

Wellington Crossing sits on the former Middlesex County Hospital property that once belonged to William Wellington. In 2005, Pulte Homes donated the Wellington House to the City of Waltham. The first phase of renovations included reroofing, removing asbestos, repairing windows, painting, and structural improvements. The second phase of renovations will begin shortly to include landscaping, adding storm windows, weather stripping, electrical work, and heating and air conditioning.

The money is there in the Community Preservation Act Fund and awaits approval from the City Council.

This summer while driving along Trapelo Road or walking by the house, look over and follow the progress of the restoration to this 1770s structure.

Waltham: Thru the Rear View Mirror (cont.) Lexington Street - 1960s

Having completed a retro-stroll of lower Moody St. one might retrace their steps noting the Nanking Restaurant (now Elephant Walk) on the corner of Main and Common Streets. Taking care and being aware of Lexington Street's two way traffic, one turns at the Union Market Nat'l Bank (now Watertown Savings Bank), and passing the Insurance Building (now a parking lot) and Police Station (Waltham Museum) one heads north toward School St. At the corner one passes the North Junior High School (Government Center) and then reaches Saint Mary High School (now apartments), and reaches Moe Black's (Dunkin Donuts plaza). - - Name Withheld

6. APPEARANCE: All window treatments shall be white as seen from the exterior of the building (i.e. curtains with a white liner or blinds that are white on the exterior side). No clothes, sheets, blankets, laundry of any kind or other articles shall be hung out of a Unit or on a patio, terrace or balcony or exposed on any part of the Common Elements. The Common Elements and Limited Common Elements shall be kept free and clear of rubbish, debris and other unsightly materials. No rugs or mops shall be shaken or hung from or on any of the windows or doors, nor shall a Unit Owner sweep or throw or permit to be swept or thrown there from any dirt or other substance.
